

# JRA Desired Outcomes



Increased victim restitution payment

Increased use of medical and geriatric parole

Increased and timely access to treatment

Increased funding for recidivism reduction programs

Increased alternatives to incarceration

Lower recidivism rate


Lower incarceration rates

Lesser sentences for low level drug offenders

Shorter length of stay

Fewer returns to custody from technical violations



- *Number of revocation sentences given under JRA revocation caps\**
- *Number of individuals eligible for earned compliance credits\**

# Implementation Measures: County Detention




Median Pretrial Custody length varies: 3 - 404 days

**Statewide pretrial population percentage is 57%**

## Q1 Post-JRA Locally Sentenced Populations




# JRA Measurement
